Living Learning Community Application Instructions

1. The 2016-17 Living Learning Community Application is available on the Housing website or available to be picked up at the Housing and Residence Life Office located in Cisler 125.
2. Living Learning Community offers will be extended via email. Students will be given a limited amount of time from the date of the email offer to confirm their membership. All documents received will be confirmed by the Housing and Residence Life Office and Academic Advisor of the LLC.
3. In order to be eligible to receive a Living Learning Community offer, students must also have a housing application on file and be admitted to the University.
4. The Living Learning Community application is separate, and not a substitute for, the LSSU housing application.
5. Questions about the Living Learning Communities should be directed to the academic advisor(s) listed below, or to the Housing and Residence Life Office at (906)635-2411.
6. All applications must be submitted to the Housing and Residence Life Office located in Cisler 125 to be considered.

To apply to live in one of Living Learning Communities, you will need to do the following:

1. Obtain admission to Lake Superior State University <http://www.lssu.edu/admissions/applying.php>
2. Submit the Housing Application and pay the first room and board payment of \$300 plus damage deposit of \$150housing deposit <http://www.lssu.edu/housing/applications.php>
3. Review the Living Learning Community options (Section I) or visit www.lssu.edu/housing/llc
4. Complete and submit the Living Learning Community Application (Section II and III). LLC application may be completed prior to making first room and board payment of \$300 plus damage deposit of \$150housing deposit.

___ **Honors Program (Ontario Hall):**

Located in Ontario Hall the Honors Program is a multidiscipline house that is associated with the LSSU Honors Program. Resident wishing to live in Ontario Hall must be accepted into the Honors Program. Information about the LSSU Honors Program can be found at <http://www.lssu.edu/honors/>.

Ontario Hall has two sides, the East-side houses females and the West-side houses males. Each side of the house has a full kitchen, laundry room, dining area, common area, access to a library/study room and two full bathrooms. The West-side of Ontario Hall has one single room and five double rooms while the East-side has one single room and four double rooms.

___ **Chemistry and Environmental Science (Huron Hall):**

Interested in Chemistry and Environmental Science? Huron Hall is a multidisciplinary house that is associated with the Chemistry and Environmental Science Club. Those within the house are must be or become active members of the Chemistry and Environmental Science Club.

Huron Hall is divided into two sides. The east-side houses females and has the library/study room as well as the dining room. The west-side houses males and has the computer room and project/entertainment room. The two sides are joined by a sign door that allows access to both sides. Each sides of the house has a kitchen, common room, and two bathrooms.

___ **Fisheries and Wildlife (Laker Hall):**

Love the outdoors? Laker Hall is a multidisciplinary house that is associated with the Fisheries and Wildlife Club. Residents do not need to be majoring in Fisheries and Wildlife Management, but those within in the house must be or become an active member of the Fisheries and Wildlife Club.

Laker Hall has one single room, three triple rooms, and one double room. Laker Hall has a full kitchen, laundry room, dining area, common area, a library/study room and two full bathrooms.

___ **Engineering and Technology (Chippewa Hall):**

Engineering majors are invited and encouraged to participate with the Engineering and Technology House. All the residents of Chippewa Hall are majoring in one of the engineering and technology programs and are required to complete a house project. The East-side has one single room, four doubles rooms and one triple room while the West-side of Chippewa Hall has one single room, two double rooms and one triple room.

___ **Criminal Justice, Fire Science and EMS (Erie Hall):**

Interested in Fire Science, Criminal Justice, or Paramedic Technology? Erie Hall Houses is associated with the School of Criminal Justice, Fire Science and EMS. All residents are full-time students in one of these programs.
